The annual reception is the culmination of a year of hard work accomplished by the Fund's recipients, the Board of Directors, family and friends. The gathering celebrates the students who have been impacted by a cancer diagnosis. These determined individuals strive to inspire others and change the world.

Established by Ann Lloyd in 1982, after the loss of her daughter Susan, the Fund awards individuals with scholarships to decrease the financial burden that often comes with the pursuit of higher education. The Fund's wish in providing moral encouragement and monetary awards is that the support will allow them to better focus their energy on their studies, extracurriculars, and other activities.

The 41st annual ceremony opened with welcoming remarks from Ann Lloyd. Susan's brother, David Lloyd, then offered a heartfelt remembrance of his sister. David reflected on the importance of family in good times and bad, and celebrated Susan's positive demeanor throughout her battle with osteogenic sarcoma.

David was followed by three-time scholarship recipient Michael Holtz. Entering his senior year at Stonehill College, he spoke about his experience with cancer, his passions, and future goals. Michael expressed his appreciation for The Susan Fund's support over his collegiate years as he finishes his pursuit of a Marketing and Economics double major. His humble thoughts merited the standing ovation from the audience.

Susan Fund Board Member, Kathy DiGiovanni, concluded the ceremony by individually congratulating the year's recipients and presenting their scholarship awards. Kathy proudly praised each recipient for their ongoing accomplishments, community contributions, and wished everyone the best in their future endeavors.

ABOUT SUSAN - CHAIRMAN JEFF BOOTH



I first met Susan when we worked together at the Fine Arts movie theaters in Westport. Susan had a terrific sense of humor and a delightful sarcastic streak. She was also the fastest cashier I ever worked with. When we knew it was going to be a busy night, we made sure Susan was ready at the cash register commanding, "Next please. Keep moving and have your money ready." She handled her osteogenic sarcoma diagnosis with the same determination as she did with selling those tickets.

Susan was going to get through this setback as fast as possible and she was NOT going to let cancer rule or define her senior year of high

school. Although she missed a lot of school because of her medical treatments, she continued to participate in school activities and hold two jobs. Susan met with tutors and completed all of her work so she could graduate with the rest of Staples Class of 1980.

Throughout our time together, Susan taught me that nothing was going to get in her way and her disease was NOT going to define her life. With my involvement with The Susan Fund, I have seen this same determination from our recipients who are courageously facing these same challenges. They fight to continue their education and go on to rewarding careers demonstrating that their disease is not going to define their lives either.

While Susan was accepted to Colgate University, her desire to attend college was never realized. When she passed away, her family and many friends wanted to do something positive to remember her. The Susan Fund was established with the goal of helping other young people who have been treated for cancer attain their educational goals, and her dream survives through the lives of The Susan Fund recipients. The Fund has continued to grow, and during the past 41 years has awarded over \$2 million in scholarships. Through the generosity of others, Susan's memory remains very much alive.

CELEBRATING SUSAN - STAPLES CLASS OF 1980 REUNION

For the majority of the Staples Class of 1980, Susan's diagnosis and battle with cancer their senior year of high school was their first exposure to a cancer patient in their age group. Classmate and friend Amy Potts remembers "Susan coming back in our senior year with one less leg and an attitude that couldn't be beat", and how she showed them "courage and taught our class to look beyond ourselves and keep smiling in the face of adversity."

Over the years, the Staples Class of 1980 has raised money for The Susan Fund through various events and at class reunions. This past August, and two years later due to COVID, the Class of 1980 was finally able to hold their 40th reunion. They remembered Susan and shared letters written to Susan and her family during her battle with cancer that Kelly Frey Pollard, Susan's good friend and a Susan Fund board member, put together in a heart-warming display.

Also attending with Kelly was fellow board member and classmate Diane Giannitti Karazulas, along with over 130 alumni. The class raised \$5,500 for The Susan Fund this year.















2022 RECEPTION SPEECH - MICHAEL HOLTZ

Hello. My name is Michael Holtz.

Everyone in this room has all been through so much, whether it be facing a cancer diagnosis, a pandemic or both. I remember my first Susan fund reception right here in Easton--and then it went virtual--and then in Greenwich outside to keep us safe. How nice to come full circle and be here in Easton again as I prepare for my last year of college. When I consider the gifts in my life - among them are - family, friends, The Susan Fund, survival and a college education.

I remember when Diane Karazulas called me to invite me to speak today. I was taken aback, flattered but confused as to what I was supposed to say. And then I realized I had



plenty that I could say and share. Despite my challenges, I have remained committed to my academics and to pursuing my undergraduate degree full-time. I remember a time when I was not so sure that I would be able to attend college or even be able to do so away from home. Diagnosed with a high-grade glioma brain tumor at the age of three, I am so proud to now be reaching my senior year at Stonehill College in Easton, Massachusetts. I do it to better myself and to dream in honor of many who never got to.

We are all gathered in this room because of Susan and her extraordinary family and friends. As a recipient of this scholarship, I know that I share in the responsibility of being Susan's legacy. It is an honor that lets me celebrate my abilities and recognize the many brave angels, like Charlie Capalbo, who befriend her above. This fund is a gift to honor Susan's memory in the most remarkable way and a gift to recipients like me. This room understands that tomorrow is promised to no one, so I try to be grateful for today. As a survivor, my grit and my gratitude remind me to be the best possible version of myself. Hope is my cheerleader and courage is my silent coach.

I am double majoring to pursue a B.S.B.A. in Marketing and a B.A. in Economics dual degree, and have focused myself on Finance extra-curriculars. My career objectives include obtaining an M.B.A. and one day utilizing all that I have learned about the marketing mix to serve me well in a career in business or financial services. I know that the job market is likely to be very competitive for students like me, so I am focused on remaining versatile, invoking all that I have learned and welcoming professional growth experiences that engage my abilities.

With compassion, integrity and emotional intelligence, I am learning that I can find ways to be involved and to have the life I have been given matter and make a difference. While volunteering has been a very important part of my life and has let me witness that I can impact others, I know that I came to Stonehill to better myself in other ways too. I want to realize the power of my abilities and am so grateful to have my undergraduate education fortify them.

I ALWAYS consider that my whole life has been negotiated because of my cancer, for my cancer, and now, fortunately, in spite of my cancer. A malignant disease once created pressure in my head, but even as a survivor, I can still experience a different kind of pressure in my head. Doubt and fear try to distract me, but I persevere. I try not to let my limitations predict my future. I believe I can overcome challenges by finding ways to learn and to matter, reminding myself that diligence defeats deficits and tenacity trumps tragedy.

Her letter of recommendation described her as possessing a "positive attitude, sense of humor and intelligence... She is truly kind, compassionate and thoughtful."

He is also a "puppy socializer" for Guiding Eyes for the Blind. Nate's reference letter says that "He is a remarkably well-rounded individual, with a kind heart, a scholarly attitude, and leadership qualities that his peers look up to." This is Nate's first Susan Fund scholarship.

IN MEMORIAM - CHARLIE CAPALBO



The Susan Fund recipients are all outstanding students and courageous survivors of their disease. In the 41 years that scholarships have been awarded, every single one of our recipients has been an example of strength and inspiration to all who meet them. Charlie Capalbo rises to the top of this special group of cancer patients. From his first interview in 2017, Charlie had a spirit and smile that captured the hearts of all of The Susan Fund board members. He radiated a health and courage that would remain part of him while he fought this disease. There was always a positive direction in his fight. Charlie had family and friends and a support system that cushioned his treatments and gave him the strength to "go for broke" while he was sick. He was fearless and a leader for the other cancer patients at the hospital. It did not matter if he was weak, tired or attached to a pole, Charlie got up and "like a pied piper" would take other residents with him as he did rounds on the hospital floor. Charlie was a leader and he brought his hope and vision with him as he became one of the most admired patients at the hospital.

Charlie's cancer journey was very difficult. After a transplant in February 2019, Charlie had to re-learn how to walk and feed himself. His health returned. His hair returned. He was back. Ten months later, 550 family, friends and supporters filled the Fairfield Theatre Company for the Capalbo Strong Crushed Cancer event to celebrate his remission and raise funds for Boston Children's Hospital. When the Capalbo family was invited to the 2020 NHL Winter Classic in Dallas, NBC featured Charlie, and his story was no longer just a local one. Sadly, Charlie's cancer returned and he passed away peacefully at Boston Children's Hospital surrounded by his loving family on April 24, 2022 after a courageous five year battle. As a passionate hockey player, the grit and determination he displayed on the ice enabled him to fight just as valiantly for his life. Charlie's positivity, humor, resilience, and grit will remain an inspiration to us all. The Susan Fund will always remember Charlie as a special symbol among our outstanding recipients and honor him as a Susan Fund superstar. We thank the Capalbo family for sharing Charlie's challenges and successes with us.

I have served on The Susan Fund Board for over 20 years. As a father of three, a grandfather of eight, a physician for over 50 years and a surviving cancer patient myself, I would have thought that I had heard most of the stories the scholarship applicants tell us about their own battle with their own malignancy. Well, I was wrong. Each year, I am awed by each new applicant's story and the courage these students have demonstrated. If you want to become more empathetic, you simply listen to their histories. I have served on other boards, but I have not found the same collegiality and camaraderie as I find with The Susan Fund Board. Earlier this year, Dana McCreesh, recipient Brent McCreesh's mother, connected The Susan Fund with Robbi Hartt, a former teacher in Fairfield County. In response to the pain and loss she and her husband, Bob, experienced in their families due to cancer, they devoted the better part of their time, energy, and resources over the past four years restoring a 1795 farmhouse to create a sanctuary where parents/families on similar journeys could come to find respite.

They are eager to share this special space, whether you are celebrating a remission, needing a reprieve after learning of a difficult diagnosis, or dealing with the loss of a beloved family member. Robbi and Bob extend their generous invitation in the hope that they can help others find healing and strength. Robbi writes, "The willow tree on our property - with long, graceful branches that bend with the wind and roots that draw nourishment from the nearby river - represents hope, comfort, the ability to heal from pain and suffering and grow stronger."

There are two separate guest units within the farmhouse. Each unit has its own entrance and can accommodate up to four people comfortably with two bedrooms, living room, and kitchen. The units are fully stocked with linens, appliances, pots and pans, Wi-Fi, washer/dryer, etc. Each apartment also has its own outdoor space to enjoy morning coffee or a glass of wine as the day winds down.

All of this is set in the beautiful southern Berkshires, whose hills, streams, and winding roads offer a welcome change of pace from daily routines. Great Barrington, Lenox, and Stockbridge are a short drive away - offering a rich variety of performing arts, museums, hiking trails, restaurants, and ski resorts.




