Dedicated to providing educational scholarships to Fairfield County students diagnosed with cancer



The Annual Susan Fund Scholarship Reception is a unique event which captures the essence of The Susan Fund's mission through the celebration of its recipients. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, last year's reception was held virtually via video recordings. As unifying as the video clips were, The Susan Fund Board of Directors, recipients, family and friends were elated to have the opportunity to reconvene in person this June.



At this year's outdoor, socially distanced reception, passing clouds were a welcome sight on the mid-80 degree Sunday held under a grand white tent on the Saint Agnes Parish lawn in Greenwich. Jeff Booth, the Fund's newly appointed Chair, began the ceremony and welcomed everyone back to the annual gathering. During his opening remarks he shared his gratitude for the Fund's Chair Emeritus and founder, Ann Lloyd.

David Lloyd, Susan's brother, then offered a warm and loving remembrance of his sister. David celebrated Susan as "an amazing person with a great smile, infectious laugh, and positive attitude. Even throughout her diagnosis and difficult 13 months of treatment, she provided a blueprint of how to live life. The Susan Fund's supportive nature and longevity truly embodies Susan's upbeat, joyous, and fearless spirit."





David was followed by Cordelia Scudder, this year's featured speaker. As a seven-time scholarship recipient, Cordelia spoke about her experience with cancer and The Susan Fund. "It is an honor to speak on behalf of all cancer survivors and to encourage them to never give up. Every time we wake up, it is another day to live life to the fullest." She expressed her gratefulness for the support The Susan Fund has given her. Cordelia remarked that, with the Fund's assistance, she has completed her course of studies in Social Work earning both a Bachelor's Degree and, following the completion of an internship, her Master's Degree.

Susan Fund Board Member, Kathy DiGiovanna, subsequently proceeded to award this year's recipients with their scholarships. She praised their past and future accomplishments in academics, extra-curricular activities, and all-around good-natured contributions to our community. The ceremony concluded with the recognition of Deanna East, last year's featured recipient, who graciously attended this year's reception since the 2020 reception was virtual.




Needless to say, I have huge shoes to try and fill. I have known Ann Lloyd for 43 years, and she is the humblest person I have ever met. Ann would never blow her own horn, so I'll do some horn blowing for her. By my calculations, in the 40 years Ann served as Chair:

- She spent more than 8,000 hours on The Susan Fund activities
- She led 320 board meetings and scholarship interviews
- Her efforts have provided emotional support and scholarships to roughly 300 Fairfield County students diagnosed with cancer
- And perhaps most impressively, The Susan Fund has awarded almost \$2 million in scholarships, including a record amount in 2021

I am looking forward to doing whatever I can to continue Susan and Ann's legacy in the years to come.





Susan Davis Lloyd was a typical all-American teenager, entering her senior year at Staples High School, when she discovered she had osteogenic sarcoma. Despite having her leg amputated, Susan continued to participate in school activities and hold two jobs. A cheerleader and an outstanding student, she was accepted to Colgate University. Unfortunately, her chemotherapy treatments were not effective, and she was unable to begin college.

When Susan died, her family and many friends wanted to do something positive to remember her. The Susan Fund was established with the goal of helping other young people who have been treated for cancer attain their educational goals. The Fund has continued to grow, and during the past 40 years has awarded more than \$1.9 million in scholarships. Through the generosity of others, Susan's memory remains very much alive.

A LOOK BACK WITH FOUNDER & CHAIR EMERITUS ANN LLOYD



Forty years after her daughter, Susan, died of cancer and The Susan Fund was established to provide educational scholarships to Fairfield County students diagnosed with cancer, Ann Lloyd stepped down as the Chair earlier this year. She will continue to remain a key member of the Board as Chair Emeritus. We sat down with Ann shortly after this year's 40^{th} annual scholarship reception for her thoughts on The Susan Fund.

Q. What were the early days of the Fund like?

Ann: After Susan's passing, my husband and I wanted to do something educationally related in Susan's honor. We were welcomed as part of the Candlelighters of Fairfield County, and established The Susan Davis Lloyd Educational Memorial Fund. In October 1991, the Fund incorporated separately as The Susan Fund, Inc. and was designated as a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization.

Q. How has the organization evolved over the years?

Ann: I am personally amazed that The Fund is still going strong four decades later. In 1982, scholarships were awarded to six recipients, and we have had as many as 37 recipients in any given year. In total, we have distributed just shy of \$2 million to almost 300 Fairfield County students diagnosed with cancer.

Q. The Fund distributes more than 90% of its contributions directly to scholarships. How have you accomplished this?

Ann: The Susan Fund is still run by a volunteer board of directors and has no professional fundraising, no staff, and no rented office space. We have always kept a close eye on our expenses so we can give as much as possible to our recipients. Aside from the costs associated with the annual scholarship reception and newsletter, almost everything goes directly to scholarships. Many people have stepped forward to honor Susan's memory by supporting The Susan Fund with their time, their dollars, or both. This has been a very personal effort, and we are very grateful to everyone whose support has made it possible for us to help these amazing young men and women achieve their dreams.



Q. What are you most proud of in terms of The Susan Fund?

Ann: I am delighted that the Fund has been able to make a difference in the lives of our recipients. It has also been very gratifying to hear back from their parents. We meet all of our candidates and encourage them to re-apply every year they're in school. It is especially heartwarming to see them grow and share their triumphs. We are also there for them when they share their challenges. Three of our current Board members are past recipients, several others are cancer survivors, and every one of us has been impacted by cancer in one way or another. So we all understand how important it is to provide support and encouragement. But the truth is, they truly inspire us and it is an honor to know such an amazing group of recipients.

Q. Where do you see The Susan Fund heading in the future?

Ann: I believe we are in a great place and well positioned for the future. We have a dedicated Board and a new Chair who was a close friend of Susan. We are all highly devoted to helping our recipients in any way we can. This year we distributed a record amount of scholarships, and we are looking into new fundraising opportunities so we can give out even more in the future. It is a great feeling to be a part of this organization and I am excited for the future.

There is an honor and dignity doing all that, year after year, a lifetime's worth of service, and now she lays down her mantle and passes the torch to Jeff Booth, content in knowing she did her very best and accomplished so much for longer than any of us could have hoped.

We can picture our mom reading this, a bit surprised, and a bit embarrassed (okay maybe ALOT embarrassed) because she does not exactly bask in the glow of a strong spotlight, but every once in a great while it is necessary to elbow her out onto the stage to accept her just desserts. We love you Mom, and are so proud of you, and thank you for making your corner of the world a better place.

She described one project that focused on improving comic book accessibility for blind and low vision readers. Another exposed Lauren to wearable electronics. This is Lauren's sixth Susan Fund scholarship. She plans to pursue a PhD in Educational Technology and will remain part of The Susan Fund throughout her education.

Jose completed his first semester at Western Connecticut State University with honors. He has taken a leave of absence due to findings related to his cancer.

He is an avid hockey fan and dedicated goalie. He looks forward to getting back on the ice someday soon.

Before he was hospitalized in January, Charlie was a COVID testing administrator and a clinical assistant at a physical therapy clinic. Charlie continues to have a fighting spirit during his treatment. As one of his doctors said, "Let's control what we can today and continue to have faith in tomorrow." This is Charlie's fourth Susan Fund scholarship.



JOSH CAPPELLO

This is Josh's second Susan Fund scholarship. He embodies much of what makes our recipients so special. His social worker notes in his recommendation, "Josh is a survivor and a warrior having to cope and live with diagnosis (of recurring brain tumors), surgery, treatment and resume life since two years of age." He missed the last year of school as he completed his treatment for a brain embryonic tumor. Josh is now transitioning back into being a student. He is attending Southern Connecticut State University and lives at home. His educational goal is to earn a Bachelor's Degree in History. Josh is especially fascinated by Ancient, Middle Eastern and Asian history. After graduation, he would like to work helping people better understand the past. Josh's reference letter noted, "He is a sincere, thoughtful, emotionally hardy, tenacious young man who is kind and ethically minded. He is brave and resilient. My recommendation is with full appreciation and admiration."



JACK DEMERS

Jack will be a junior this fall at Eastern. He changed his major from Sports Management to Communications because he enjoys working with people and socializing. Jack looks forward to taking a TV production class this fall to try and discover which communications route works best for him. Lauren describes her educational path as majoring in vocal performance or double majoring in speech, language, and hearing science. She plans on pursuing a Master's Degree in Speech Pathology. Her goal is to work with singers and vocalists in need of voice or speech therapy. Lauren has been a singer since she was very young. She almost lost her voice after she completed aggressive cancer treatment in her junior year. She wrote, "Through that experience, I have found a purpose. Through my work as a vocal therapist, I want to help others find or rediscover their voices, as everybody deserves to have one." Lauren has performed at the Crystal Theatre's production of the operatic version of Pinocchio and virtually at the Make-A-Wish Gala where she amazed everyone with her incredible vocals. Her physician noted, "I was struck by Lauren's positive attitude, sense of humor and intelligence. She is the embodiment of resilience and strength." This is Lauren's first Susan Fund scholarship.



SONA KOCINSKY

Tufts University

Sona is a graduate of Trumbull High School, where she had an outstanding academic record. She is in her freshman year at Tufts. Sona fell in love with the school's location, welcoming attitude and the superb academic program. She is planning to major in Biology and then pursue a graduate degree, possibly in medicine. Sona is a passionate volunteer and was featured in an article in her local newspaper. She has worked with Infinite Love for Kids Fighting Cancer and raised \$12,000 for Spin4Kids. She worked with Sustainable Trumbull and was a math tutor. This is Sona's first Susan Fund scholarship. She discovered The Fund through her granters at Make-A-Wish Foundation. For her wish, the organization is building a garden for the patients at Sloan Kettering in White Plains where she was treated. This reflects the kind of person Sona is. One of her references described her as "someone who has faced many challenges but has emerged as a strong and powerful person." This is Sona's first Susan Fund scholarship.

A Tribute to Wally Meyer - Co-Founder of The Suzan Fund




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
